Throughout her illness, she was determined to face it head on, getting second opinions, and trying different treatments. She kept her love of nature by going for walks outside as long as she could. She lived near DC and worked at the National Center for Education Statistics, which collects, analyzes and makes available data related to education in the U.S. and other nations. Kashka was always interested in education, but most of all in connecting with people. This is from Roger Wynne '88: Joanna Rosen and I had the pleasure of having Kashka as a freshman on our trip in the fall of 1986, FOOT's second season. She was a remarkably positive person. That following winter—I think around Valentine's Day—she circulated a poem to all of us on that trip. (see below) As a sign of those times, she printed it in the then-distinctive Mac font on pink paper and delivered it to our rooms. It was an ode to the power we draw from friendship.



Kashka's FOOT trip






Now here is the news from you... Please remember that most of this news came from before the Covid-19 hit the US, so it may seem as though we were living on a different planet.

Greg Felt: Susan and I still live in Salida, Colorado and have our 30th wedding anniversary coming up in September. I am still part-owner of ArkAnglers but am not nearly as involved as I used to be. A couple of young guys are running the day to day and I am just providing oversight and guiding some favorite long-time clients. Susan's interior building products company, Home & Design, is doing well in this strong national and local economy. Our daughter, Kestrel (26), works with her there. Our son, Rowen (22), is a newly minted software engineer out in California's East Bay.

I am now in my fourth year as Chaffee County Commissioner. I have been Chairman for a few years now and it is a very consuming job. Overseeing public health, building department, human services, road and bridge, landfill, jail, housing, EMS, ... it's been quite an eye-opener for a former fishing outfitter. On the flip side, though, what I may lack in bureaucratic experience seems to be compensated with small business experience and 35 years of guiding/outfitting. I am getting a lot done!

Last fall we had a forest fire that became the number one priority fire in the nation. At one point I had 1100 fire fighters camped out at our fairgrounds. We only lost one dwelling but now I am dealing with post-fire recovery, working relentlessly to do everything we can before the "monsoon" rains hit in July. We can't prevent flash-flooding but we can mitigate the impacts. The fire, and now the US Census, are

not things I can control. We just have to deal with them and do the best we can. I have many, many more interesting initiatives underway but it's too much to cover here. Suffice it to say that we did a major community visioning process over the last few years and have developed about 40 projects aimed at bringing those visions to reality. Passing a conservation finance ballot measure and creating a community foundation are a couple that are complete. A big thrust for me now is forest health and wildfire mitigation. It is a major undertaking but desperately needed!

I've also been doing a lot of work with water. I serve on the boards of two water conservancy districts and last month the governor appointed me to be the Arkansas River Basin rep to the Colorado Water Conservation Board. My senate confirmation hearing is next week. I cover about 28,000 square miles and 1.2 million inhabitants. The CWCB administers \$50-150 million a year in severance tax revenues, sets water policy for the state, negotiates our interstate compacts, and manages the instream flow and watershed health programs.

I am known as the man of many hats around here and with this latest appointment I think I have finally hit my limit on how much I can handle. (Actually, I am pretty sure I have exceeded it.) I am running for reelection to the county commission this year and so far I do not have an opponent (I am unaffiliated so in my first race I had two opponents). Hopefully, I won't have to run a real campaign as I truly don't have time!

Despite my whining about work, I do want to reinforce that our door is always open here in Salida and we are glad to help visitors find their way to a good time in the central Rockies. Best wishes to all! Greg



Jake Keaney: I'm finishing up my 9th year in New Haven and my last year of medical school, starting residency in the summer.






